

# Assistant Ride Coordinator Kent Risen

When planning rides, we always strive to make the rides fun while also being as safe as routing allows. Occasionally we run into hazards that can't be anticipated. This is especially true when the ride is some distance away eliminating the chance to pre-ride.

While our road captains and ride leaders try to provide information to the riders behind them this isn't always possible and can't be relied on. We all must remember whether we are riding solo or in a group, each individual is always responsible for riding their own ride and recognizing their limitations.

Some hazards that we run into are roads with less-than-ideal road surfaces. This could be new pavement that has become wet mixing with released oil, older road surfaces with damage to the riding lanes and/or shoulders, or sometimes roads that have no paved surface. When riding on these surfaces it is always important to slow down, increase the distance between yourself and other vehicles, and make gradual changes during acceleration, braking, and steering. If possible, avoid coming to a complete stop so that you can better maintain balance on two wheels, it is best if trikes avoid stopping also so they don't cause a two-wheel bike to stop.

Probably the most important is to decide before riding into these types of conditions if there may be alternative routing options or if the prize at the end of these roads is worth the risk. My co-rider is especially good at reminding me to consider the risk.

# Sunday November 6th Indiana Covered Bridge Ride

Miles Justice, our awesome Individual of the Year planned a ride to some of the Indiana-covered bridges and lots of people showed up to do this ride!! Thanks, Miles, for planning it and for letting us all tag along. Not only did we have a lot of great Chapter A members show up on two and three wheels, but we also had some great folks from the Kentuckiana Slingshot Posse group join us. Here are the Bridges we were able to see and most of them we were able to drive thru:

#### Medora Covered Bridge Jackson Co, Indiana



Located in Carr Township in Jackson County, Indiana, this bridge crosses the East Fork of the White River running parallel to State Road 235 and is the longest-covered bridge in the US. The bridge's entire original historic truss is still in place with no repairs and no structural changes. The Bridge was built in 1875 by J.J. Daniels at a cost of \$18,142.00. It took 9 months to build and before its construction people had to cross the River by Ferry. In 1968 the bridge was scheduled for Demolition due to the building of a new modern parallel

bridge to be opened in 1973 but the covered bridge was spared by an order from the Governor in 1971. In 2007 the bridge was put on the list of the National Register of





# The Medora Bridge

The Medora Covered Bridge was built in 1875 by noted timber bridge builder I.J. Daniels. It was built to carry local traffic across the East Fork of the White River forty years before there was a state highway system. In the early twentieth century, route US 50 crossed the river here, using this bridge. Later, and until 1972. State Road 235 crossed the river on this structure.

This bridge is the longest historic covered bridge in the nation. Its span between the abutment faces is 431 feet. Shed extensions for weather protection extend 16 feet on each end beyond the actual bridge span. The Medora Bridge is also the last remaining three-span covered bridge in Indiana.

The bridge is classified as a Burr Arch truss, which combines timber arches with a stiffening truss. This is a sophisticated structural system in which the arches greatly strengthen the truss, and the truss keeps the arches in their proper curve. Daniels used oak for the bottom truss members, for the vertical posts, and for the deck. He used yellow popler wood for the rest of the structure. You can see marks of hand-hewing on some of the top truss timbers. Wrought iron bolts and tie rods clamp the many pieces together.

### The Builder

Joseph J. Daniels was born in SE Ohio in 1826. His father, Stephen Daniels, was a prominent carpenter and bridge builder, and an agent of the pioneering bridge engineer Stephen Long. J.J. assisted his father and learned well as a young man.

At age twenty, the younger Daniels began to take bridge confinissions on his own. Between 1847 and 1852 J.J. built several bridges in Ohio. In 1853 he built a notable 600-foot long covered bridge over the White River near Hazelton. IN In 1861 Daniels moved to Parke County and went into business for himself. The built the 207-foot span Jackson Bridge in that year. Fourteen years later he designed and built the Medora Bridge.


Daniels came to prefer the Burr Arch truss style, and usually built that except when required to use a different type. The robustness of his designs were much respected, and many people considered him the best covered bridge builder in the state. More than 53 covered bridges are known to have been built by Daniels.



### Ramp Creek Covered Bridge Brown Co, Indiana

Located at the entrance to Brown Co State park this bridge is a rare doubletunneled covered bridge. It was built in 1838 by Henry Wolf over Ramp Creek in Putnam County and later moved to the park entrance after it was scheduled to be

dismantled for road construction. It is a single-span Burr Arch Truss structure and is 96 feet long with a 7ft overhang at each end. It is the only two-lane bridge in Indiana and the oldest covered bridge still standing in Indiana. (Indiana Historical Society)





# Bean Blossom Covered Bridge Nashville, Indiana

This bridge used to be the main road from Bean Blossom to Nashville and boy was it a challenge to get to!! Kent and I bailed when Miles started down the road and said, "the first parts gravel, oh it's all gravel" Now being the Co-rider on a two-wheel Honda Goldwing when I heard the words "all gravel"

I whispered in my Rider's ear ever so softly (or at least in my head it was very softly) "Don't go down there!!" And he listened!! (YAY!) Some of the other two wheels turned around and some did make it thru. Apparently, there was also a big deep wide hole at the bottom of the road that proved a challenge for not only the other two wheels but the three wheels as well. Unfortunately, the slingshots had to turn around at the bottom with the help of Don Price and a nice guy who came out and opened his gate to make more room to turn around. Anyway, kudos to the drivers that did and did not make it thru and everyone's maneuverability. We were all able to meet back up at a nearby overlook. It is an adventure that we will all talk about for a while. At least until our next one!!



# Robert N. Stewart Bridge, formerly the Second Street Bridge (Not a Covered Bridge Bridge)

This was a "bonus bridge" on our ride. This bridge is a fully suspended cable-stayed bridge, the first cable-stayed bridge of its time in North America. It was built in 1999 and is suspended by 40 cables in a fan shape. The bridge frames the gateway to downtown Columbus, Indiana.



#### New Brownsville Bridge Columbus, Indiana

Now located over a branch of Driftwood River in Mill Race Park, the New

Brownsville bridge was built by Adam Mason between 1837 and 1840. The bridge's original location was Brownsville, Indiana (hence the name), and was 116 feet long with an 8-foot overhang on each end. The bridge was built as a single-span-covered timber bridge. It spanned the East Fork of the Whitewater River and was rehabilitated in 1991. In 1986 it was shortened to 96 feet and relocated to its current spot. It is the only Long Truss bridge in Indiana. (Covered Bridges of Indiana




### Scipio Covered Bridge Scipio, Indiana

This Bridge was built between 1886 and 1887 using the Howe Truss design. The



Bridge is about 124 ft long and was built by a construction company out of Toledo for \$600. The bridge was originally intended for a Railroad bridge and was rehabilitated in 1984 and again in 2015 to repair semi-truck damage. The total cost for its complete refurb was \$540,000






#### Westport Covered Bridge Westport, Indiana

Located in Sand Creek Township, Indiana this bridge was built in 1880 and is a single-span, Burr Arch and Truss type twelve-panel bridge built on limestone abutments. It



has a gable roof and shiplap siding and is 130 feet long. The bridge was almost lost in the 1959 flood and in the 1970s became a victim of neglect. It was restored in 2004 to its present-day beauty for a total of \$450,000. (Wikipedia)



#### **James Covered Bridge Lovett, Indiana**



Located over Graham Creek in Jennings Co, Indiana this bridge is another Howe truss bridge design. It is named after Thomas S James who owned the property and mill next to the bridge. It was built in 1887 and is 122 feet long and took five to six weeks to build. It is supported by one-foot-thick limestone abutments and a wood superstructure that came from the local James Sawmill. The bridge was

rehabilitated in 2008 for a cost of \$403,200. (Bridges and Tunnels website)



We actually had one more covered bridge on our list to visit but we ran out of daylight. Oh well, there is always next time! What a great day for a ride!!



# Kentucky Blast August 17th-19th 2023 will be





# **District Rider Education Director** Rider Education Report

Fall riding can be some of the best we can experience, especially regarding practicing our riding skills. There are warm and cold temperatures, windy days, and rain and snow at any moment. There is an abundance of random road hazards in the many

diverse types and sizes of animals hurrying to find food and mates before winter, leaves and grass showing up in unexpected places, and newly resurfaced roadways, all adding additional challenges to keep our vehicles in the lane where they belong. These challenges are overcome much more easily if we have been trained to deal with them effectively.

The GWRRA Rider Education program is still alive and well and being managed by some familiar faces. While it is true that GWRRA is officially closed, the Rider Education Program and the University are still operating as before. The Levels Program continues to see much activity, and now when the Members reach their next Level, they can receive the patches and pins to which they are entitled without cost. Even the Level IV application can be submitted free of charge.


After December, the training courses, seminars, and other learning programs of Rider Ed and the University, and including the HSI program (formerly the Medic First Aid program) will pick up where GWRRA left off in the new RPM Academy under the leadership of Susan Huttman and Lorrie Thomas. This organization will be its own entity with its own EIN number. It is a simple LLC with only volunteers. There are no paid positions. It will have its own insurance policy to cover the trainings that are presented by its instructors. Anyone who is qualified to teach the curriculum can be an instructor for RPM Academy, regardless of their affiliation with another group. Of course, there will be guidelines for the instructors to follow, and there will be recertification opportunities as before. Those who want to continue to teach can do so. Reimbursements for training expenses and other details are still being finalized. The RED Hat program will also be continued to recognize those trainers who deserve it. The RPM Academy will have one centralized location from which everything is managed. They will continue the rider database and have complete access to the HSI

information. Training events will also be managed so that all trainers get at least enough opportunities to keep their certifications.

On-bike courses will be offered for \$50.00 per bike, and HSI classes will be \$35.00 pr person. Registration will be available on the RPM Academy website, complete with payment opportunity, or the option will exist to print out the application and return it by mail or fax. The courses will be open to anyone with the proper credentials to operate their equipment (driver's license with endorsement, etc., and the proper gear).




