

## Ride Coordinator Kent Risen

The weekend before the Ride-In, Karen and I embarked on a motorcycle adventure to Athens, OH, eager to explore some of the renowned Windy 9 routes. The area, celebrated for its scenic beauty, did not

disappoint. The roads were curvy, hilly, and offered a thrilling ride through lush landscapes and rolling hills.

We dedicated a day and a half to our exploration, managing to ride five out of the nine routes. On the first day, we tackled the Triple Nickel and the Zaleski Zipper. The second day saw us conquering the Hocking Hills Nipper, Rim of the World, and Lazy River routes. Each path presented its own unique set of challenges and delights, making for an exhilarating experience.

As we rode, I found myself frequently reminded of the vanishing point or limit point technique, a concept discussed in our December 2023 newsletter article. This technique is crucial not just for handling curves but also when approaching blind hills. For those unfamiliar, the vanishing point is the furthest point on the road where you can see, which helps determine your speed and stopping distance.

On the Triple Nickel route, the importance of this technique became particularly evident. There were several turns immediately following blind hills. The key here

is to adjust your speed so that you can stop safely, if necessary, when you reach the limit point. This approach ensures that you can handle any surprise curve on the other side of the blind hill or stop for an obstacle after cresting the hill.

Imagine riding up a hill where the road's crest blocks your view. As you approach the top, you must be prepared for whatever lies beyond – whether it's a sharp turn, another vehicle, or an obstacle. By using the vanishing point technique, you focus on being able to stop within the distance you can see, adjusting your speed accordingly. This method was especially critical on stretches of road that resembled a roller coaster, with multiple crests creating numerous vanishing points. Each crest required us to be vigilant and ready to stop, ensuring a safer and more controlled ride.

The Roller Coaster-like sections of the Triple Nickel were particularly memorable. The road would rise sharply, then dip, only to rise again. Each time we crested a hill, it felt like we were launching into the unknown. Yet, by keeping the vanishing point in mind, we navigated these areas with confidence, always prepared for what might come next.

The Zaleski Zipper, with its tight, twisty curves, demanded a different kind of attention. Here, the vanishing point technique helped us maintain a steady speed and smooth line through each turn, enhancing both safety and enjoyment. The Hocking Hills Nipper offered sweeping curves and beautiful vistas, while the Rim of the World provided breathtaking views and challenging terrain that tested our riding skills.

Our final route, Lazy River, was a perfect end to the adventure. It was more relaxed, with gentle curves winding alongside a serene river, allowing us to unwind and enjoy the tranquility after the more intense rides.

Throughout our journey, the vanishing point technique proved invaluable, reinforcing the importance of riding with caution and awareness. It reminded us that while the thrill of the ride is exhilarating, safety should always be our top priority.

Reflecting on our trip, it's clear that the Windy 9 offers something for every rider – from challenging curves to scenic beauty. Karen and I left Athens with a deeper appreciation for the stunning landscapes of Ohio. We look forward to returning and exploring the remaining routes, armed with the lessons learned and memories made on this unforgettable journey.

## State Educator's Report

The growth of Wing'D Rider is something that is getting a lot of attention these days. We are all being asked to assist in the efforts to attract more members. Because there is strength in numbers, this will benefit us all. The question of course is how do we attract new members, especially when we

feel we are not good speakers or comfortable approaching strangers, or even leaving little ducks on the seats of motorcycles (which I think is a great idea)? How do we find people that want to be with us?

One way to do this is to be the rider or group that you would want to join, a group that is excited about riding and the friendship we are all enjoying now. Presenting a good appearance while you are out on a ride can cause the curious to approach you. Would you want to be part of a group that rolls into a restaurant and haphazardly goes to random spots anywhere, or a group that patiently stays together as they navigate the lot to an open section where they can all be together? Are you not involved or excited about riding? Have you lost the spark you had when you first joined? How do we get that excitement to return?

<u>Read</u>. Subscribe to enthusiast publications or find them at the local library. Motorcycle magazines have many exciting stories of people like us doing what we love to do. The internet has opportunities to learn about riding techniques that can make our sport safer and more entertaining. Knowledge is power and a tool kit you can use when someone asks about your riding skills.

<u>Take classes</u>. After riding for 27 years, I finally took the Basic Riding Course. For me it was mostly a review, but for several others in the class, I was an example to follow. They asked me about my riding because they saw something they wanted.

Practice. Put all the knowledge from the reading material and the riding classes into actual performance. Smoothly navigating through a crowded parking lot or a busy gas station will draw attention to you, in a good way. This attention will increase exponentially when in a group of like-minded riders. Being the good rider that you are, and working to be the great rider you want to be, will attract people to you. All you need to do is answer their questions with the sincerity and energy that you have for motorcycling. The inquirer will want

what you have. Lead by example. Because of your continued practice and education in our sport, you will attract new members without any extra special effort.



This is such a fun event and we've tried to make it a simpler process by revising the resume so it's easier to fill out. It is really all about having fun while representing the great State of Kentucky. It also allows you the opportunity to work closer with the Kentucky staff and just be more involved in our great group. Now let's talk about riding the Windy 9!!

As I said Kent and I just got back from riding the Windy 9 in Ohio! This ride was originally Chapter C's ride and Kent and I decided to join them. We were so excited when they posted the ride, we booked our room right away and started planning. We added the ride to Chapter A's ride schedule back in March to give our group plenty of time to plan since some of our members had been interested in riding the Windy 9 the previous year. Unfortunately, none of our Chapter A members ended up being able to go and then Chapter C decided to cancel the ride a few weeks before the trip. Kent and I were so disappointed!

Well, you know what they say, when life gives you, lemons make lemonade! So, we decided we would still go and go we did. The weather started off a little iffy for Athens, Ohio with a possible 40% chance of rain on Saturday but by the time we rode up on Friday, Saturday's rain chance had decreased to 15%! We also decided to rebook our hotel to Athen's city center so we could walk to our dinner restaurants because we knew we would be spending long days on the bike, and we were so glad we did. The hotel staff at Athens Central Hotel were friendly and helpful and even had a Windy 9 tourism packet to give us at check in, the room was spotless and modern and conveniently located in the center of Athens, Ohio.

Athens is a cool quirky college town, but college was out for the summer and Memorial Day Weekend ended up being a great time to visit with no crowds. We got right into local restaurants without a wait and experienced no traffic back ups in the multiple areas of highway construction. We kept saying if we had visited during the tourist season in the fall traffic would've been a nightmare so thanks Chapter C for picking Memorial Day Weekend for the ride, it worked out great for us!!



The first day (Friday) we left Louisville around 8:30am and rode Interstate from Louisville to Zanesville, Ohio so we could pick up our first Windy 9 route, the "Triple Nickel" (Hwy 555) which extends from Zanesville Ohio down to Athens Ohio or vice versa depending on which direction you want to take. Since we had an overnight stay in Athens, we decided to start the route in

Zanesville and end up in Athens. The Triple Nickel did not disappoint and was full of lots of twisties, switchbacks, blind curves, hills, and beautiful rural scenery. We think it might've been our absolute favorite of the Windy 9 rides we got to do

and so much fun ya'll!!

When we finished the Triple Nickel, it was around 4ish in the afternoon, time to check into our hotel. Once we

got to our room, we realized we had just enough time to squeeze in another short Windy 9 ride before the day was done. We chose the "Zaleski Zipper" since it was only about a 60-mile route. We zipped up and down nice hills and curves through the Zaleski State Forest and past Lake Hope State park. It was another fun one

y'all. The final mileage for Day 1 ended up being close to 415 miles of pure joy!!



The second day (Saturday) we decided to head over to Hocking Hills State park




and visit Ash cave. The Windy 9 route that would get us there was the "Hocking Hills Nipper". The first turn on this route had us riding across a covered bridge!! What an awesome

start!! We then rode hills and curves through Wayne National forest. It was a beautiful route, and we finally found Ash Cave by following the park signs instead of the gps shortcuts which wanted to take

us down gravel roads. NO gravel!!



After visiting the beautiful Ash Cave in Hocking Hills state park and stretching our legs a bit we decided to hop on our



next Windy 9 ride called "Rim of the World". One of "America's most popular rides" according to the Windy 9 website. This route took us through charming small towns, more of Wayne's National Forest, and past Burr Oak State

Park riding by beautiful lakes and ponds full of water lilies. We decided our lunch stop would be at the historic Stockport Mill in Stockport, Ohio but when we arrived, they were

not open until 5pm. Plan B was the Blue Bell Diner in the nearby small town of McConnelsville, Ohio and the Cheese curds were to die for!!



After lunch our next ride was the "Lazy Rivers" which took us alongside the



Hocking River and Ohio River where we passed the Ohio River locks and dams. Needless to say, the views here were beautiful and we ended up in the biker friendly town of Pomeroy, Ohio. From Pomeroy we headed back to Athens for the evening. Day 2 ended up being another 274 miles of beautiful scenery and amazing riding!! When we got back to Athens Saturday night we were watching the weather back home in Louisville. We had planned on possibly trying to ride another Windy 9 route before we headed for home the following day but there was a large storm system moving into Louisville on Sunday morning and then moving toward Athens Sunday evening and

## **State Individual of the Year:** Miles Finley Justice

June 6th marked the end of an error for me when I picked up my new-to-me 2021 Can-Am Spyder RT Limited at CC Powersports in Shepherdsville. I had been interested in these machines since they were first introduced in the US back in 2009. Being a shorty, the Spyder seemed like a great option

for me to own a touring machine while maintaining stability. But, at that point, they were a relatively unknown and unproven machine, and I was not willing to take a risk.

Flash forward to 2019, when Dean Miller insisted, I try out his Goldwing Trike. That was all it took for me to be hooked on 3-wheeling. Since purchasing my 2006 GW Trike in September 2019, I have put just over 50K miles on her. Despite a few mechanical issues here and there (primarily with the Motor Trike kit, not the Wing), I have enjoyed owning and riding this bike. Thus, when it came time for a newer ride, it was a tough decision whether to buy another Wing or finally take a chance on the Spyder. Admittedly, price was a bit of a consideration – I could get a comparable Spyder for around \$15K less. I found a couple of interesting options there, but Cindy Simpkins also sent me a link to a machine at CC. Don joined me for a test ride Wednesday and a few hours later, I was signing a purchase agreement and making a deposit. Cindy drove to Shelbyville the next afternoon to schlep me back to CC to complete the purchase and pick up my baby.

Thus, I have now joined the ranks of the Spyder riders. But I still feel like I belong as a member of Wing'd Rider at every level, national, state (Kentucky Road Riders) and chapter (Derby City Road Riders). ### Basically there are four levels:

- 1. Safety by Commitment
- 2. Safety by Education
- 3. Safety by Preparedness
- 4. Safety by Enhanced Commitment and Preparedness

#### **Rider Education Levels Program**

#### "THE BUILDING BLOCKS OF RIDER EDUCATION"

### Level 1: Safety By Commitment

### Rider and Co-Rider requirements:

The expressed commitment of the Rider or Co-Rider to strive for and practice safe riding.

### Level 2: Safety By Education

### Rider requirements:

- Have 5,000 safe miles.
- Have a current motorcycle license.
- Have completed an approved on-bike Rider course within the past three years.

### Co-Rider requirements:

- Have 5,000 safe miles.
- Have completed an approved Two-Up Rider course or GWRRA Co-Rider seminar within the past three years.

### Level 3: Safety By Preparedness

### Rider requirements:

- Completed a formal approved on-bike Rider Course within the past three years.
- Maintain current First Aid, CPR or MEDIC First Aid certifications.
- Carry a First Aid kit on the motorcycle.

### Co-Rider requirements:

- Completed an approved Two-Up Rider course or GWRRA Co-Rider seminar within the past three years (a sanctioned PLP is not allowed to be used for this Level).
- Maintain current First Aid or CPR or MEDIC First Aid certifications.

### Level 4: Safety By Commitment and Preparedness

### Rider requirements:

- Have been current in Level III for at least one full year.
- Have ridden a minimum of 25,000 safe miles.
- Be current in both First Aid and CPR certifications.
- Wear proper riding apparel at all times while riding.
  - Proper riding apparel, a.k.a.: proper riding "gear" will include, at a minimum, a DOT (FMVSS 218)/Snell (M2010) /
    ECE 22.05 approved helmet (approved standard applicable to the local area), eye protection, long sleeved jacket/
    shirt (no "riding pull on/off sleeves"), long legged sturdy pants, full fingered gloves and over the ankle footwear.
     Some have coined the acronym ATGATT standing for All the Gear, All the Time.

### Co-Rider requirements:

- Have been current in Level III for at least one full year.
- Have ridden a minimum of 25,000 safe miles.
- Be current in both First Aid and CPR certifications.
- Wear proper riding apparel at all times while riding (see definition in the Rider section above).


